

#### A BRIEF HISTORY

- In 1988, the Town of Dover purchases


  Dover Town Forest Land
- ▶ 1,392 acre parcel purchased by Town
- Dover pays \$410,000
  - \$42,000 in Grants from Vermont
     Housing and Conservation Board
- Additional 5,000+ nearby/abutting acres purchased by United State Forest Service


# WHAT WAS THE SPARK?

Conservation






# TAKING THE LEAD

- Town of Dover is project lead
  - Purchase facilitated by Phil Bartlett
  - Support from many different recreational user groups
  - Support from residents of the Town of Dover

#### 1988-2006

- Management plan is drafted after purchase
- User groups begin utilizing Town Forest
- Unsanctioned trail creation and expansion grows recreational opportunities slowly on the property
- Most active user groups: hiking, biking, horse riding, snow shoeing, x-country skiing
- No marketing of property, word of mouth and first hand knowledge only for most of this period







#### **NEW PLANS**

- Conversation in 2006 sparks discussion of management priorities and plans for DTF
- 2007 Creation of the Dover Conservation
   Commission
  - Tasked with oversight of management and expansion of recreation opportunities
    - 2007-2010 New management plan is created for the property
      - Input from all interested stakeholders as well as a professional forester via public hearings and surveys
  - 2010 Creation of expanded parking lot at end of Rice Hill Road

#### WHERE'S THE MONEY?

- With conservation and recreation plans coming into focus, where does the funding come from?
  - State recreation grants and funding opportunities
  - User groups implementing and funding expansions/improvements
  - Implementation of 1% Local Option Tax in summer 2007.
    - All collected 1% tax to be allocated to Economic Development, including recreational opportunities in Dover



#### 2010-PRESENT

- 2017 Unsanctioned cutting of skiing glades
  - Sparks decision to sanction glade cutting in specific sections in 2018
- COVID-19 Prompts discussions for parking and recreation expansion as usage sees all-time high
- 2021-2022 Dover Trails and Recreation Committee makes recommendation to expand current parking lot and rename property 'The Dover Town Forest and Phil Bartlett Recreation Area<sup>'</sup>
